How to forward a text message you received to someone else.

Have you ever received a text message that you thought should really be forwarded to someone else (i.e. a message with instructions from the boss, for example)?

Forwarding a text message to another person is really pretty easy once you know how to do it.

However, the Forwarding procedure isn't all that obvious because that option is pretty much "hidden" from view on both iPhones and Androids.

Follow the steps below to forward a text message that you have received to another person: **If you have an iPhone...**

- 1 Tap and hold **the message you'd like to forward** until a menu pops up.
- 2 Tap More.
- 3 Tap the **arrow** located at the bottom right-hand corner of the screen.
- 4 Enter the **recipient** you wish to forward the message to, then **send the message**.

If you have an Android phone...

Note: The procedure for forwarding a text message can vary a bit from one Android phone to another. Therefore, I recommend that you use the instructions below as a general guide.

- 1 Tap and hold **the message you'd like to forward** until it becomes highlighted.
- 2 Tap the **Options** icon in the top-right corner of the screen (it looks like **three vertical dots**).
- 3 Tap **Forward**.
- 4 Select the **recipient** you wish to forward the message to, then tap the **Send** button. That's all there is to forwarding an SMS text message to another person, and it really can come in handy at times. Pretty easy, right?

"Quizzes on Social Media, Caution"

Be sure you know the person asking and if it is a website - usually, it is a website that is not trust worthy. Fighting fraud against older adults

10/17/2023 Protecting older adults is one of the FTC's top priorities, and a <u>new report to Congress</u> tells how the agency tackled fraud, scams, and other issues affecting older adults over the last year. It's been a busy year at the FTC, so what are some of the highlights? One of the cases with the biggest impact on older adults was the FTC's case against <u>Publishers Clearing House (PCH)</u>, charging that the company used "dark patterns" to mislead people about how to enter sweepstakes drawings, making them think they had to buy something to win (or increase their chances of winning). A court required PCH to turn over \$18.5 million to the FTC to use for customer refunds.

While younger people were still more likely to report losing money to fraud than older people, reports to the FTC showed that, during 2022, older adults:

- reported losing more than \$1.6 billion to fraud, compared to about \$1 billion the year before.
- reported losing big to investment scams: \$404 million in reported losses, with reports often describing fake cryptocurrency investment opportunities that targeted people on social media.
- reported losing more to business impersonation scams (especially scammers pretending to be Amazon) and romance scams than the previous year.
- were more than six times more likely than younger adults to report losing money to a tech support scam.

To help older adults spot, avoid, and report scams, the FTC keeps collaborating with community groups, law enforcement, financial institutions, aging and consumer professionals, and hundreds of others to share fraud prevention material. This year, partner organizations ordered 2.1 million pieces of information from the <u>Pass It On</u> campaign in English and Spanish. You'll find campaign material in Spanish at ¡<u>Pásalo!</u>.
